



Log in:

1. Go to mccordlibrary.org

Your username is your library card number

Ex: 20035000000000

And your password **** is the last 4 numbers of your phone number

Ex: If (123)456-7890 is your phone number 7890 is your password

4. Click "log in"

Search for the book you wish to read:

If the picture of the title of the book you wish to read has an overdrive logo underneath, an ebook version is available

- 5. Click check out
- 6. Select Kindle or Read in browser

Kindle

- 1. Select Kindle version of book
- 2. You will be taken to Amazon store

If you are not taken to the amazon store, make sure to allow pop ups and try again

3. Check the book out and read on your Kindle as normal (This feature is not available if your Kindle does not have a web browser. If you have a kindle paperwhite or earlier, you must download an epub version of the book and add it to your kindle using your computer.)






