You will be informed when your items are available. Your items will not be immediately available for pick up. Please follow pick up instructions.

Placing Holds by Phone:

You can also place holds by phone. Call (814)725-4057 and request up to 10 items. Your items will not be immediately available for pick up. If you have a cell phone, please call our library once you have arrived. Please follow pick up instructions.

No Cell phone:

Place your holds from home by calling (814)725-4057. Your items will not be immediately available for pick up. When you receive hold notice, follow the pick up instructions. Please arrive promptly during your 15 minute pick up window.

Scheduling:

When your hold items are ready for pick up, a day and time will be decided.

Pick Up instructions:

Please have your library card or other photo ID ready. Once you arrive, call the library at (814)725-4057. The items will be delivered to the curb.

Returns:

Items must be returned in the book drop.

We thank you for working with us while we try our best to serve you within the current restrictions. We will be quarantining all items that return to the library and no overdue fines will be charged during the quarantine period.


