The Taking of Jemima Boone By Matthew Pearl

On a quiet midsummer day in 1776, weeks after the signing of the Declaration of Independence, three young girls disappear near the Kentucky settlement of Boonesboro, the echoes of their faraway screams lingering on the air. One of those young women was Jemima Boone, the 13 year-old daughter of Daniel and Rebecca Boon. Yes, that Daniel Boone.

This book not only tells the story of the events surrounding the rescues of those three girls, but also demonstrates the pivotal nature this event had in the formation of the state of Kentucky and further expansion to the west.





Book Review

<u>Made free and thrown open to the public: community libraries in Pennsylvania from the colonial</u> <u>era through World War II</u> By Bernadette A Lear

<u>Made Free and Thrown Open to the Public</u> charts the history of public libraries and librarianship in Pennsylvania and is written by Bernadette A. Lear, a Pennsylvania librarian. <u>Made Free</u> is based on archival research at more than fifty libraries and historical societies, and describes a long progression from private, subscription-based associations to publicly funded institutions, highlighting the dramatic period during the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries when libraries were "thrown open" to women, children, and the poor.

<u>Made Free</u> explains how Pennsylvania's physical and cultural geography, legal codes, and other unique features influenced the spread and development of libraries across the state. It also highlights Pennsylvania libraries' many contributions to the social fabric, especially during World War I, the Great Depression, and World War II.

Most importantly of all, <u>Made Free</u> convincingly argues that Pennsylvania libraries have made their greatest strides when community activists and librarians, supported with state and local resources, have worked collaboratively.
